
#### or particular artists working in other disciplines whom you admire and have shaped your style of writing?

#### You've earlier described how you originally began writing poetry as part of your addiction recovery. How do you see your craft evolving as you move past that chapter and into rency. new ones?





#### What would you say has led to your desire to explore acting?

I like the level of expression you can reach through acting and the character depiction aspects as I like to understand people in extreme depths. People keep shrieking in my ear telling me to do it and a huge part of me is fascinated by it. I've been taking lessons. Let's see.

But I'm working on a book right now with a friend. And that is more thought-out, on the basis of delivering something to the people and giving them what they supposedly need.
